ADORATION

A·dore: love and respect (someone) deeply. Some common synonvms of adore are reverence, revere, venerate, and worship. While all these words mean "to honor and admire profoundly and respectfully," adore implies love and stresses the notion of an individual and personal attachment.

Ad·o·ra·tion is the same as adore in definition. Adore is the verb and adoration is the noun. Eucharistic Adoration is a Catholic devotion dating back to the early days of the Church. It involves exposing a consecrated host, the Blessed Sacrament, allowing people to sit and pray in the presence of Jesus Christ. But what makes praying during Eucharistic Adoration any different than the prayers you say throughout whether at home, work or your daily life?

True, you can pray to God anywhere. God is omnipresent, which means He is everywhere at all times. As the Word of God says in Proverbs 15:3, "The eyes of the Lord are in every place, keeping watch on the evil and the good." God is always near, and thus, you can always enter into His presence in prayer.

God is also omniscient, which means He knows everything, including your thoughts. King David says in Psalm 139:1-4,

"Lord, You have probed me, you know me.; You know when I sit and stand; You understand my thoughts from afar. You sift through my travels and my rest; with all my wavs You are familiar. Even before a word is on my tongue, Lord, You know it all.

God's omnipresence and omniscience are both wonderful truths that Catholics can take comfort in every day, worshipping at your local parish. But Eucharistic Adoration differs from your daily prayers in one key aspect. The body, blood, soul and divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ, are substantially present in the Eucharist. In other words, when you participate in Eucharistic Adoration, you pray and worship Jesus in a more intimate, present and real way.

Through the faith, commitment and sacrifice of parishioners at St. Pius, we have an adoration chapel that is open

24 hours/day from Monday morning till Friday Morning. This is a hugh gift and one that is available to anyone anytime. When exposed, Jesus can never be alone. (who would leave him since he is really present?) We currently have 95 time slots of one hour each that require someone to make a commitment to be

Our goal is to have two people committed to each time slot. This allows flexibility when someone has a conflict and cannot make it, their partner is there. We currently have 4 open slots with no one to fill them except the substitutes that sacrifice their time for Him. We also have 7 people who do more than one hour which technically means an open slot.

there with Jesus.

GOD'S INFINITE LOVE AND UNFATHOMABLE MERCY???

Is "Anything" more powerful than God's infinite love and unfathomable mercy???

The answer is that "Nothing" is more powerful than the Love and Mercy of our Great God. He makes this very clear in His awesome message of Divine Mercy that He communicated to the world through St. Faustina Kowalski in the early 1900's. My wife Joyce, son Brian and I have been going to the National Shrine of Divine Mercy since 1999. When our churches closed due to Covid in 2021, the National Shrine had also announced that it was closed and there would be no public celebration of the Feast of Divine Mercy. But we felt strongly that we needed to be there even if there was nothing. So, in 2021 we reserved our motel and went to Stockbridge, MA. As it turned out, hundreds of people had the same idea and the Marian Priests stationed at the shrine were hearing confessions from inside their cars and we were only a few among those hun-

dreds who came to celebrate the Feast of Divine Mercy at the National Shrine. The grounds are beautiful with life sized imported Stations of the Cross, a Grotto of Lourdes, and many small shrines and statues outdoors. It was awesome to see that with the public celebration cancelled, the power of God's Mercy still drew people to this celebration.

Last year, 2022, they had an abbreviated version of the Celebration of the Feast of Divine Mercy, including Mass and the Chaplet.

And this year for the first time since 2020, the Great Feast of Divine Mercy was celebrated in full force with busses from all over, and the whole hillside full of pilgrims who travelled distances to come to this great shrine to celebrate this great

feast. The Shrine church was open and full of people coming to praise God's mercy. The large Adoration tent, Confession tent, and Gift tent were back in full scale operation. Hundreds of volunteers and Marian Shrine staff all worked hard to ensure safety and assistance. Father Don Calloway led off the speakers and, by the Grace of God, the public celebration of the Feast of Divine Mercy at the National Shrine is alive and growing....and "Nothing is more powerful that the awesome Love and Mercy of our God". I encourage all to read St. Faustina's Diary "Divine Mercy in My Soul" which contains the entire message of Divine Mercy as communicated to her by Jesus, Himself. Also, it is a beautiful shrine and only about 5 hours of driving away. Why not check it out?
