

HARRISBURG Impact Report 2023

2023 Diocesan Annual Campaign

The Diocesan Annual Campaign (DAC) provides the vast majority of the financial resources needed to operate Diocesan ministries and programs, which in turn provide support for many parish level programs.

The DAC partners with our parishes and the faithful,

working together to strengthen the ministries and outreach, and further the mission of Jesus Christ in our Diocese.

In 2023, our goal was to raise \$7,339,816 to support these ministries. Below is a breakdown of how DAC gifts were distributed to these programs.

Evangelization (27%) includes support for our Multicultural, Campus, Youth and Young Adult, and Family and Respect Life Ministries; Parish ministry support and Communications.

Parish support (22%) includes preservation of Parish records, **Youth Protection**, continuing formation for clergy and religious, Liturgical materials and Canonical assistance through the Tribunal.


Vocations (7%) support our seminarians and those in formation as Permanent Deacons.

Support for the **Bishop's Office** (13%), the Priests Retirement Center and supplemental medical for our clergy.

Educational programing (15%) supports the work of our Parish based Catholic schools and Catholic high schools, our Parish Religious Education programs, catechist formation, the Principal's Academy, and Catholic Scouting.

Administrative operations (8%) include the Office of the Vicar General and our Development office, which covers the Campaign cost.

The DAC funding provides a portion of the financial resources needed for **Catholic Charities (8%)** to operate their more than 20 programs.





Catholic Education

Throughout the 2022-2023 academic year, the Office of Catholic Education continued to support our 34 Catholic schools and all parish religious education programs with resources, training and guidance.

Major accomplishments for our Office of Catholic Education in the past year include:

- Partnering with over 20 National speakers from the National Catholic Education Association (NCEA), Renaissance, Hallow, and University of Notre Dame to host the return of our annual Diocesan Education Conference for all our teachers and school leaders.
- Partnering with NCEA to host an NCEA Regional Event at the Diocese of Harrisburg for the Mid-Atlantic Catholic dioceses.
- Students from grades K through 12 completed more than 60,000 service hours in their communities.
- 625 graduating seniors in 2023 earned approximately \$43 million in scholarship monies.
- Through the hard work of our schools, Hispanic student enrollment has increased to 10% of our total student enrollment.
- Thanks to our partnership with RedefinED Advisors, individual schools have greatly increased their EITC-program financial aid funding over the past 18 months.
- In partnership with the Safe Environment Office, we offer VIRTUS safe environment training programs to teachers in our Catholic schools and parish Religious Education programs.
- Completed our Strategic Vision "working groups" in 2023 in order to strengthen and sustain Catholic education in our Diocese in particularly challenging areas: Discipleship, Operational Vitality, Compensation, Governance & Leadership, and Strategic Planning.
- DAC funding has helped our communication with schools and parishes and our office to be more efficient and effective in that communication.
- Pursued new workshops for professional development in Catholic Classical Education for interested groups and MTSS (Multi-Tiered Student Support), and have planned a conference for all catechists in our programs in early February of 2024.
- High School working groups (Directors of Studies, Deans of Students, Department Chairs) are meeting for collaboration and discussion regarding academic needs, curriculum, and safety. Elementary schools continue to meet and revise curriculum annually.
- Bishop Senior hosted a meeting in October of this year with all high school boards to onboard them and to listen to the challenges and blessings of governance in our schools.









Life & Dignity









The Office for Life and Dignity provides direction and support for Respect Life initiatives, ministries to Persons with Disabilities as well as prison, health and pastoral care ministries. This year, the Office expanded many programs, including those listed below.

Disabilities Ministry:

- Hosted the annual Diocesan Camp at Kirchenwald, attended by 20 campers and 28 volunteers
- Coordinated the Diocesan Life & Dignity Mass, attended by close to 600 of the faithful from throughout the Diocese

Care for Creation Ministry:

• Inaugural "In the Beginning" Series (Care for Creation Mass and 8 presentations) with more than 140 registrants

Respect Life Ministry:

- Coordinated the Diocesan Respect Life Mass
- Supported the National and PA Marches for Life (January & October)
- Continued to support the pregnancy care centers throughout the Diocese through the Pennies for Life program. \$1,748.49 was distributed at the end of last fiscal year.

Healthcare:

- Made three pastoral visits and supplied the ministry resources for the hospitals and healthcare locations, residential programs, and nursing homes in the Diocese
- Hosted a workshop for priests and deacons on "Serving our Parishioners who Struggle with Mental Health"
- Improved and revised the Catholic pastoral services patient management process at Hershey Medical Center, saving at least 60% of the previous administrative preparation time
- Looking ahead, we are planning regular meetings to support networking, development, and formation for our Health and Pastoral Care ministers.

<u>Prisons:</u>

- Met with the prison ministers in the Diocese to discuss the history of this ministry and to begin planning ways to build on past success.
- Reviewed and updated the information on detainment facilities throughout the Diocese.
- Looking ahead, we are developing plans to offer prison ministers new resources and development/formation opportunities.



Supporting the faith lives of young adults in the Diocese is a priority and 2023 saw a number of new and expanded ministries to support our younger Church. Below is a snapshot of our Diocesan evangelization efforts from this year.

Young Adult

- 15 Active Young Adult Groups in the Diocese
- 6 New Young Adult Groups formed this year
- 50 participants in Get Connected
- 38 attendees at the Day of Reflection
- 85 attendees at the Young Adult Retreat
- 10 participants in World Youth Day in Portugal
- Hosted four young adult leader meetings this year, connecting with more than 60 people
- Numerous Theology on Tap programs supported throughout Harrisburg, Lancaster and York
- In total, young adult events were attended by over 500 people in 2023

<u>Youth</u>

- Supported 44 parishes with their Youth Ministry programs
- Worked to establish 5 new youth ministries
- Supported the Helping Hands resource distribution to the homeless initiative
- Hosted four youth ministry meetings this year, reaching 25 youth ministry leaders throughout the Diocese

Campus Ministry

 Supported 10 active Campus Ministries programs

- Hosted the Catholic Campus
 Ministry Holy Hour for 30 college
 students
- Hosted a Campus Minister Orientation for more than 15 campus ministers
- Hosted two additional campus minister meetings this year, reaching more than 25 of our clergy and lay ministers

<u>CYO</u>

- The Diocese is home to 63 girls teams and 72 boys teams
- 630 girls and 792 boys participate on our teams
- More than 3,000 people attended the end-of-the-year tournaments

<u>Scouts</u>

- Supported the work of 34 Boy Scouts of America troops across 19 parishes and 31 Girl Scouts/ Campfire troops across 13 parishes in 2023
- Hosted the annual Scout Mass for 150 people

Culture, Identity & Outreach







The Diocese has a rich heritage of cultural diversity and ethnicity. Under our Office for Culture, Identity and Outreach, we spotlight and minister to the mosaic of peoples and cultures that exist in the Church family. Highlights of our work in 2023 are below.

Vietnamese Apostolate

In January, the Vietnamese community began the new year with a great celebration at St. Anne and Our Lady of La Vang Parish in Lancaster. The celebration included Mass followed by a reception/festival.

Black Catholic Apostolate

- February brought the Black Catholic Apostolate Mass in celebration of Black History month. Most Reverend Jerome Feudjio, Bishop of the Diocese of St. Thomas in the U.S. Virgin Islands, was the Celebrant.
- In July, the Diocese sent representatives to the National Black Catholic Congress, that is typically held every five years. At the Congress, we celebrated the Catholic faith with over 3,000 Black Catholic faithful from across the United States and participated in a food distribution project.
- The Black Catholic Apostolate picnic was hosted in August at City Island, Harrisburg. Music, dancing, food, fellowship, and a display with the black Catholic Church history in the local area were featured.
- A Mass celebrating African heritage was hosted in November at St. Joan of Arc in Hershey.

Hispanic Ministry

- In partnership with Women of Grace, a one day seminar was held for the Hispanic women of the Diocese, bringing in over 100 women.
- The Hispanic Charismatic Renewal Group held a Conference

/ Congress at the Diocesan Center where over 325 people attended.

- Representatives attended the National Catholic Hispanic Conference for Diocesan Leaders, which has assisted in forming a larger network of Hispanic Catholic ministry leaders.
- Continue to assist parishes with Hispanic Liturgical Celebrations.

Other Cultural Events

- Celtic Fling: Coordinated the Liturgy Mass for the community. This Mass is hosted annually on the grounds of the Pennsylvania Renaissance Faire.
- In May, we extended awareness of the Diocesan Filipino community in the first Santa Cruzan event. This event hopes to bring to light the Filipino community living in our Diocese.

<u>Identity</u>

- The Diocese participated in the Annual Courage Conference (via ZOOM) which gave the opportunity to listen to presentations and testimonials of people with same sex attraction. Courage International is an organization that serves the spiritual needs and accompaniment of those with a same sex attraction, speaking the teachings of the Church through love.
- In order to support all our Church families, we continue searching for ways to support the spiritual needs of our LGBTQ brothers and sisters, while being true to Church teaching.



Thanks to the generosity of our DAC donors, the Office for Laity & Family continued to provide strong programming, formation, and support for lay organizations, parish marriage and family ministries, and the lay faithful throughout the Diocese in 2023.

The Office sponsored over 30 retreat and conference opportunities that addressed a variety of needs:

- Marriage preparation
- Bereavement support
- Marriages in crisis
- Men's and Women's Conferences
- Parish Pastoral Council training

The annual 50th Wedding Anniversary Mass continued to be a hit, with 275 couples invited to brave a downpour and celebrate their important milestone at Good Shepherd Parish.

This year also saw continued growth and change for the Office. We welcomed a new Director for Laity & Family in May, and with her, a renewed vision and mission for the Office. In the second half of the year, the Office visited and established foundational relationships with 15% of the Diocese's parishes and 25% of the major Catholic organizations and apostolates in the area. In addition, the Office focused on four critical initiatives:

- Reviewing and revising policy and best practices for Diocesan marriage preparation to simplify and streamline guidance while addressing emerging needs in the preparation process
- Introducing two new ministry opportunities: Red Bird Ministries, which guides families through the complexity and trauma of the loss of a child, and Life-Giving Wounds for adult children of divorced parents
- Introducing the first Diocesan Mass for Child Loss for families that have lost a child from pregnancy through adulthood
- Expanding Springs in the Desert (introduced in 2022) resources and events for couples in a season of infertility
- Preparing for the relaunch of an updated and expanded NFP Ministry
- Revising and introducing a New Mentor Couple Formation Day, while laying the groundwork for an intentional Diocesan Mentor Couple Ministry starting in early 2024

In the year to come, the Office will continue to grow foundational relationships across the Diocese and partner with parishes to establish new ministries and foster holistic approaches to supporting strong and faithful individuals, families, and communities.

- Sponsored 11 Seminarians
- Celebrated the ordination of 3 new priests and 4 new transitional deacons
- Provided psychological assessments for 2 new seminarians





- Welcomed 40 young men to the annual Quo Vadis Days Retreat at Mount St. Mary's Seminary
- Sent one seminarian for summer Spanish language studies in Mexico
- Visited multiple grade schools and all high schools within our Diocese to invite students to consider a religious vocation
- Welcomed over 60 high school students to "Visit a Seminary Day" during National Vocation Awareness Week
- Visited Catholic Campus Ministries at colleges within our Diocese to share a vocational invitation
- Made direct and unique contact with over 20 young men open and seriously discerning a priestly vocation



There is no better way to share the faith and the love of Christ than through the celebration of the Holy Mass. Catholic Charities

Catholic Charities in the Diocese of Harrisburg provides help and creates hope for thousands of men, women, children and families in our communities. As the human services arm of the local Church, Catholic Charities is fighting poverty, impacting communities and improving the quality of life for our brothers and sisters through their core program areas: counseling support, immigration and refugee services, Evergreen House for women, Lourdeshouse Maternity Home, Interfaith Shelter, adoption and foster care services, intensive family services, Paradise School and Lancaster Intensive Day Treatment.

Through the work of Catholic Charities, we understand the challenges that many are facing, whether these challenges are physical, emotional, or economical. When a family is homeless, Catholic Charities helps them find shelter. When someone is struggling to make ends meet, basic necessities are provided so they can live with dignity. When a client confronts a mental health crisis due to years of trauma, services are in place to help them recover. When a pregnant mom is scared and homeless, Catholic Charities gives security to her and her baby. When someone is dealing with addiction, Charities is there, walking with them on the road to recovery. All of this is done because Christ calls us to do so.

During the 2022-23 fiscal year, Catholic Charities in the Diocese of Harrisburg provided help and hope to our communities by:

- Providing 40 state-wide adoption network services
- Placing 18 foster children and providing training for 24 foster parents
- Serving 8 clients and 25 family members through family-based mental health services
- Offering English as a Second Language (ESL) classes for 491 individuals
 - Conducting 6,505 session hours for our counseling services
 - Providing 7,440 bed nights and 33,876 meals at Interfaith Shelter
 - Offering 25,896 transportation service miles for clients at Evergreen House
 - Providing quality educational programs for 106 students at Paradise School





Communications

The Communications Office provides support for the Diocesan Bishop, our Diocesan ministries and programs, and the parishes and Catholic schools with communications, public relations, social media, crisis communications, media relations and digital communication expertise. This office also shares the news of the Diocese through the digital *Catholic Witness*. During 2023 and through your support of the Diocesan Annual Campaign, this office accomplished the following:

- Provided a Catholic social media library for all parishes, updated weekly with new content, leading to a 336% increase in engagement with social media users in 8 months
- Live streamed directly or coordinated the live streaming of nearly 20 Masses for the Diocese, including Ordinations, the Chrism Mass, the Red Mass, the White Mass, and the Installation Mass for Bishop Timothy Senior, reaching more than 24,500 people
- Produced over 50 new videos, which were viewed more than 130,500 times by over 121,400 people. Total video views of new and old content this year was over 366,400 views with more than 4.9 million impressions
- Posted more than 1,300 messages to the Diocesan social media channels, seeing over 1.5 million impressions, reaching more than 1.2 million users
- Produced over 57 programs for our radio and podcast ministry, including Candid Catholic Convos
- Maintained 5 Diocesan related websites
- Produced 26 issues of *The Catholic Witness*, with nearly 250 local stories
- Developed more than 25 press releases and media statements/interviews, leading to a total of more than 150 media articles, reaching a potential of 40,800,000 people in 2023

Tribunal & Canonical Affairs

Early in the Church's life, the need was recognized for some sort of structure to adjudicate questions of justice raised by its members. Jesus outlined the order to be followed when one Christian follower had a complaint against another, including the need for witnesses and possible punishment (Mt. 18: 15-17).

Centuries after apostolic times, the Church recognizes the authority of many civil courts in most areas of life. But the Church, as a society of believers, claims the exclusive right to answer questions that involve spiritual matters (e.g. sacraments), members' rights, and violations of Church law. In a more formal way, this is done through the Church's own court or legal system. At its most basic level, this court system exists in every diocese through a tribunal. The Diocesan Tribunal of Harrisburg is the first level or instance of the multi-tiered court system of the Roman Catholic Church.



This office is a vital component to Diocesan operations. The Tribunal reflects Christ in its ministry of justice through the compassionate and equitable application of Church law to protect the rights and dignity of each person without discrimination, and to provide an opportunity for healing.

In meeting this vital work, so far in this year the Tribunal has:

- Received more than 275 inquiries regarding Decrees of Nullity (the annulment process)
- Accepted over 100 formal cases for a Decree of Nullity
- Processed over 75 non-formal cases for a Decree of Nullity
- Granted over 380 permissions and dispensations for couples entering marriage
- Answered numerous questions from clergy and parish staff concerning the sacraments and issues that directly or indirectly involve Canon Law.
- Submitted petitions for the resolution to clergy issues
- Worked on canonical concerns dealing with communities of religious life
- Assisted the Finance Office and Office of the Bishop with transferring Diocesan properties as it relates to Canon Law

Archives

The Archives for the Diocese of Harrisburg maintains a library of approximately 3,500 volumes and a wide range of sacred items and artifacts, and houses over 130 collections.

In the past year, three new first-class relics and over 1,500 new documents and historical books have been catalogued and added to the Diocesan Archival Collection. The Archives has continued to assist parishes with the creation of their parish historical collections as well as assisting individuals with not only their own Sacramental Records search but also those of their ancestors.



Youth Protection

The Diocese of Harrisburg has once again been found in compliance with the U.S. Bishops' "Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People." The annual audit was conducted in September by StoneBridge Business Partners, a Rochester, N.Y. firm contracted by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. The Diocese has passed this independent audit of its child protection procedures every year since the policy was adopted by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops in 2002.

This year, the audit was conducted onsite at the Diocesan offices, which occurs throughout the nation's 195 dioceses once every three years. As an onsite audit, in addition to providing written documents demonstrating our compliance with the Charter, the process also included interviews with Diocesan staff who work with our Safe Environment and Youth Protection programs, members of the Diocesan Review Board, select members of the clergy, and Bishop Senior. Site visits to randomly selected parishes and Catholic schools in the Diocese were also part of the audit process. During these visits, the auditors met with parish and school staff to review that location's youth protection procedures.

Some of the information reported through the audit this year included:

- 12,786 students enrolled in Catholic schools in the Diocese or in parish religious education programs in the Diocese received Safe Environment training.
- 150 priests, along with 71 permanent deacons and 29 candidates for ordination (seminarians and candidates for the permanent diaconate) completed background checks and safe environment training.
- 836 educators and administrators in Diocesan Catholic schools, 1,812 employees of the Diocese or its parishes across fifteen counties, and 7,855 volunteers at schools, parishes and Diocesan facilities have received training on how to keep children safe.

The Diocese of Harrisburg provided all the requested information to the auditors, which they confirmed to be complete in their final report. This annual audit evaluates each diocese's efforts to ensure the protection of children, including criminal background checks and educational awareness programs on recognizing and preventing abuse.

Vicar General & Secretary for Clergy









The Secretariat for Clergy and Consecrated Life has a mission to support the life and work of priests, permanent deacons, and those in consecrated life as they live lives of service within the communion of the Church. This office promotes vocations and is committed to providing ongoing formation for those in Holy Orders and supporting those in consecrated life.

In addition, the Office of the Vicar General and Moderator of the Curia assists the Diocesan Bishop in coordinating the pastoral governance and ministries of the Diocese. By working closely with the Diocesan Bishop and other members of the Diocesan administration, the Vicar General is charged with leading the Diocesan offices and ministries in the fulfillment of pastoral goals and objectives set forth by the Diocesan Bishop.

Some of the activities of these two offices in 2023 included:

- Coordinating the development of a new Priest Handbook
- Supporting the Office for the Formation of Permanent Deacons, which is forming 16 men
- Supporting the Vocation Office, which currently oversees 11 men in formation for the priesthood
- Working on the ongoing task of recommending clergy assignments
- Assisting and coordinating healthcare and mental health services for priests who are experiencing difficulty in ministry or are on a leave of absence
- Planning and hosting a successful Clergy Day for the priests and permanent deacons of the Diocese
- Coordinating the Deacon Day of Remembrance
- Planned the one-day Clergy Day event, with topics focused on personnel management, the new propaedeutic year required for seminary formation, the revised translation of the Order of Penance, and the Order of

Christian Initiation for Adults

- With the Continuing Education Committee, planned several clergy continuing formation workshops and events for 2023 and 2024
- Planned seven training sessions for our newly ordained and new pastors. These afternoon sessions, held over a period of several weeks, cover a range of topics including parish and rectory living, personal financial planning, and Diocesan services and programs.
- Hosted the Annual Deacon picnic
 - Coordinated activities with the Sisters' Council, including their events and retreats for the religious of our Diocese
- Coordinated the meeting for the Deacon Community Board and establishing a new, monthly eNewsletter to better communicate with this community
- Assisted with the coordination of the annual Deacon Retreat for our permanent deacons and their wives


